1. Love is Here To Stay C Verse 96bpm

George Gershwin, Ira Gershwin

1938

George's last song (1937). Ira wrote lyrics as loving tribute to his brother. Vernon Duke & Oscar Levant heard George sing the verse which he did not document in writing. Vernon reconstructed it after George's death. Gene Kelly sang this beautiful ballad to Leslie Caron in the classic 1951 film, An American in Paris.

2. Some Day My Prince Will Come Bb 120 bpm Frank Churchill, Larry Morey

1937

Written for Disney's Snow White & the Seven Dwarfs. It's unusual harmonic structure is attractive to jazz musicians and is considered a standard.

3. And I Love Her Eb 108 bpm

John Lennon, Paul McCartney

1964

John Lennon said this ballad was Paul's 1st Yesterday. High praise indeed. Billboard #12

120bpm C 4. Sing

Joe Raposo

1971

1963

Sesame Street standard and a 3rd generation family favorite. "Sing of good things, not bad Sing of happy not sad. Don't worry if it's not good enough for anyone else to hear ... jut sing, Sing a song." Good message for all.

5. It Could Happen To You 104 bpm 2F/2G Jimmy Van Heusen, Johnny Burke 1943

Jo Stafford & Billboard 1944 Bestseller Bing Crosby Billboard #10 in same year!

6. How Insensitive 120 bpm D min Antonio Carlos Jobim, Vincente De Moraes

Haunting melody and lyric – Heavy borrowing from Chopin Prelude Opus 28 #7

7 Secret Love 112 bpm G Sammy Fain, Paul Francis Webster Doris Day Sammy Fain sang & she almost fell apart. Bicycled to studio. Sang 1 take with orchestra. Nominated for Oscar in Calamity Jane & won in 1954 Also Billboard #1

8. Autumn Leaves 136 bpm Eb/Cm Joseph Kosma, Johnny Mercer 1945 Jazz standard covered by over 1000 musicians.

9. The Sweetheart Tree 120 bpm F Henry Mancini, Johnny Mercer 1965

Featured in The Great American Race starring Tony Curtis, Jack Lemmon & Natalie Wood

The Days Of Wine And Roses 104 bpm 2F/2D Henry Mancini, Johnny Mercer 1962
Title from 1896 poem, Vitae Summa Brevis. Oscar Winner in 1963.

11. Uh Oh 120 bpm Cm Brad Mersereau 2016

One of Dad's favorite expressions.

12. The Gentle Rain 104 bpm Cm Luiz Bonfa, Matt Dubey 1965

Luiz was a pioneer and champion of the Bossa Nova. One of Tony Bennet's favorite songs Sung by Astrid Gilberto Barbra Streisand, Sarah Vaughan Featured in 1966 film with same title

13. Sweet Potato Fries 120 bpm Bb Brad Mersereau 2019

Inspired by Nan Overall who was talented singer with the Mellomacs. She exclaimed during her lunch 2 years ago, "I want me some Sweet Potato Fries! 4 note blues motif wrote itself. I thanked her as she departed and this blues became her song.
